Recently, as you will read in the Family News section, I lost my Dad and even being in the industry the cost of Death was a bit overwhelming to me and my family.

Learn the Terrain

Be there at dawn for morning rounds and get to know the nurses you'll need to deal with. Hospitals keep temperatures frigid to help slow bacterial and viral growth, so bring warm clothes your spouse will be kept warm, but you're on your own.

Accept Help

You don't get extra credit for doing it alone. When friends offer to form a meal train or a neighbor volunteers to walk the dog, just say yes. If someone asks what you need, tell them honestly and specifically. A friend stood guard over my husband while I strolled the aisles of Target buying nothing. I called it practicing self-care.

Updates at the Park—Technology

Warren County Memorial Park is excited to announce to you all that we have committed to digitizing our records to make it easier and more convenient for the families we serve.

We started this process with a company called WebCemeteries, who specializes in cemetery websites and software. This partnership has allowed us completely revamp our website which will be going live by the end of September. The new website will allow you to purchase flowers, wreaths, candles, and memorial maintenance as before—but in the near future will also provide you the opportunity to locate your loved one, see available property, and even schedule appointments to come us.

The software we are currently transitioning to will provide us with digital copies of our records—some of which will take some time to enter manually into the system. However, included in this is a geolocation of every grave in the cemetery, which allows you to see a satellite image of the exact location of your loved ones cemetery space. This will also allow you to see what available property is close to your loved one. In addition, over time we will be uploading photos, obituaries, and photos of the memorial into this program—and you as family and friends will have the opportunity to upload information as well if you so choose!

We are excited to take this step forward, and to be able to roll out the next stage of our "Cherished Hearts/ Cherished Memories" program for you all!

The various gardens throughout the cemetery have been getting a bit more attention this year to try and regain control of weeds and growth. This is something we are looking to tighten up to give the cemetery a better overall visual esthetic.

The most hard to come by item this year has been <u>straw</u>! Yes, dried hay/grain straw. We use it to blanket areas and graves to help replant grass and also wet areas to help them stay dry. However, this year we have been unable to find straw! If you know anyone or anywhere please let us know!

The water system throughout the cemetery suffered some blockages that our team had to work to get unclogged. Water pressure in Ten Commandments should be back to normal!

The bank by the office and residence has been pulled due to rabbits causing many of the plantings to die out—the plan is to replant grass and a strip of plantings at the bottom and top.

As always, please let us know if you notice any issues when you are visiting the park. We do not always have the time to check on everything that needs maintained. We appreciate when you let us know if something is off. It is always a boost to our spirits to

Did you know? Origin of "Taps"

During the Civil War, in July 1862 when the Army of the Potomac was in camp, Brig. Gen. Daniel Butterfield summoned Pvt. Oliver Wilcox Norton, his brigade bugler, to his tent. Butterfield, who disliked the colorless "extinguished lights" call then in use, whistled a new tune and asked the bugler to sound it for him. After repeated trials and changing the time of some notes which were scribbled on the back of an envelope, the call was finally arranged to suit Gen. Butterfield and used for the first time that night. Buglers from other nearby brigades traveled over to the camp of Butterfield's brigade to ask the meaning of the new call. They like the melodious notes, and copying it, returned to their camps. However, it was not until some time later that orders or permissions were given to substitute it throughout the Army of the Potomac for the time-honored call which came down from West Point.

In the western armies the regulation call was in use until the autumn of 1863. At that time the XI and XII corps were detached from the Army of the Potomac and sent under command of Gen. Hooker to reinforce the Union Army at Chattanooga, Tenn. Through its use in these corps it became known in the western armies and was adopted by them. From that time, it became and remains to this day the official call for "Taps". It is printed in the present Tactics and is used throughout the U.S. Army, the National Guard, and all organizations of veteran soldiers.

General Butterfield, in composing this call and directing that it be used for "Taps" in his brigade, could not have foreseen its popularity and the use for another purpose into which it would grow. Today, whenever a man is buried with military honors anywhere in the United States, the ceremony is concluded by firing three volleys of musketry over the grave, and sounding with the trumpet or bugle "Put out the lights. Go to Sleep"...

There is something singularly beautiful and appropriate in the music of this wonderful call. Its strains are melancholy, yet full of rest and peace. Its echoes linger in the heart long after its tones have ceased to vibrate the air.
