- The wreaths are then removed after a set number of days; this is due to them being fresh wreaths.

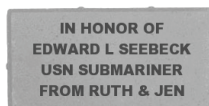
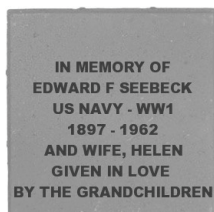

## Living in the Moment After Loss

When we lose someone we love, it's natural for our thoughts to drift into the past - replaying memories, conversations, and moments we wish we could relive. Just as easily, our minds can race into the future, worrying about how we'll carry on without them. Both the past and the future matter, but neither is where we truly live. Life only happens in the present moment.

Living in the moment after loss doesn't mean forgetting. It means allowing yourself to be fully present for what is here now, while still honoring what was. A walk outdoors, a shared laugh with a friend, or a quiet cup of tea can be small anchors to remind us that even amidst grief, life continues to offer moments of peace.

Practicing presence can be as simple as pausing to take a deep breath, noticing the colors of the sky, or feeling gratitude for the love you once shared. These moments don't erase the pain, but they create space for healing to gently unfold.

By choosing to notice today - just as it is - we allow love and memory to walk alongside us, not as weights pulling us back, but as companions helping us forward.

Below are some reflection pieces to help you:

### 1. **Finding Comfort in Ritual**

After loss, our daily routines can feel empty without the presence of our loved one. Yet small rituals - lighting a candle, tending a plant, or sitting quietly in a favorite chair - can become ways to honor them. These acts remind us that love still finds expression in the simplest gestures.

*Reflection Prompt: What small daily ritual could I create that helps me feel connected to my loved one?*

### 2. **The Healing Power of Nature**

Grief can feel heavy, but nature offers gentle reminders of renewal. The turning of the season, the return of birds, or even a single flower breaking through the soil can reassure us that endings always hold the promise of new beginnings.

*Reflection Prompt: When I step outside today, what sign of life or renewal can I notice that brings me hope?*

### 3. **Carrying Stories Forward**

Our loved ones live on in the stories we tell - over dinner, in laughter, or when passing along wisdom they once shared. Speaking their name and remembering their quirks allow us to keep their presence alive, not only for ourselves but for those who never knew them.

*Reflection Prompt: What is one story about my loved one I can share this week with someone else?*

## Maintenance Updates

2025 has been the year of Murphy's Law in the Park! Anything that could go wrong, tended to go wrong at exactly the wrong time.

We were faced with one of the harshest winters of recent years, followed by a very, very, wet spring. As you know, this resulted in unfavorable conditions for maintenance of the grounds, which led to a period of being unable to get our equipment onto the grounds (aside from burials) to cut grass, tend graves, etc. We spent some time repairing and servicing french drains at the top of the cemetery help redirect water flow, which we believe will help the grounds dry out a bit quicker. Our tractor had some electrical issues that were finally diagnosed and repaired, but then further into this year experienced some transmission issues that took some time to diagnose, find the parts, and we are currently repairing the transmission. Our 140 tractor is over 50 years old, and while that may sound like a lot, it is important to note that we have not had to replace the transmission in that time, so it was due. Otherwise the tractor is in great mechanical shape.

We were able to get the park looking good for Memorial Day and continued to work at getting caught back up despite the set-backs.

Many thanks need to be made to Davies Tractors, who helped us every time we needed it most!

As we are starting to dive into fall maintenance, we are looking at getting the fountain repaired (which took a back burner because of the grounds).

We continue to be dedicated to ensuring that WCM Park remains the best cemetery in Warren County.

## Let Someone Hold the Lantern for You

Grief can feel like walking through a dark forest with no map. Some days you're just trying not to trip over the roots. Other days, you can't even find the path. And the thought of asking someone to join you in that darkness? It feels awkward, maybe even impossible.

You might think, I don't want to be a burden. They have their own lives. Or maybe, If I let someone help, it means I'm not strong enough. But here's the thing — grief isn't about proving your strength. It's about surviving something your heart never wanted to face.

Sometimes, you just need someone to hold the lantern for a while so you can catch your breath.

### Asking for Help When the Words Are Heavy

Skip the speeches. You don't need to explain every detail. "Can you come sit with me?" is enough.

Be small and specific. "Could you pick up groceries?" or "Would you call me tonight?" makes it easier for people to say yes.

Let it be imperfect. You might cry, sit in silence, or talk about random things. That's all okay.

### Accepting Help Without Feeling Like a Burden

Think of help like a handrail on a staircase. You still climb the steps — the handrail just keeps you from falling.

When someone offers, try saying, "Yes, thank you" instead of "You don't have to."

Let yourself remember: people offer because they care, not because they pity you.

One day, you'll get to be someone else's handrail, too.

### You Don't Have to Light the Whole Path Alone

Grief is heavy. Sometimes unbearably so. But the weight shifts when you let a few trusted people carry pieces of it with you. You don't have to see the end of the forest yet — just enough light to take the next step.

And if the only step you can take today is whispering, I could use a little help, then that's enough.

## Keepsake Tools for Helping with Grief

We have put together some tools to help you or someone you know deal with grief. Please feel free to clip these or save this page.

### Five Quick Tools for Dealing with Grief

1. Ground yourself through Breath & Body Awareness  
Inhale 4 sec, exhale 6-8 sec. - keep your hand on your chest
2. Expressive Outlets  
Write a letter, journal, draw, or talk out loud.
3. Rituals of Remembrance  
Create a small ritual: light a candle, look at a photo, cook a meal
4. Gentle Structure in Daily Life  
Stick to small anchors; daily tasks at the same time.
5. Supportive Connection  
Reach out to trusted friends, family, or a support group.

### You Don't Have to Carry This Alone

Grief is heavy, and some days even asking for help feels impossible. But you don't have to explain everything — "Can you sit with me?" or "Could you bring dinner?" is enough.

When someone offers help, say "thank you" instead of "you don't have to." They're not trying to fix you — they just want to walk beside you for a while.

You're still the one moving through this, but letting others hold part of the weight can make the next step possible. And right now, the next step is all you need to take.
